

Mousetropolis

Key Vocabulary:

- City: a large town.
- Map: a diagrammatic representation of an area of land or sea showing physical features, cities, roads, etc.
- Museum: a building in which objects of historical, scientific, artistic, or cultural interest are stored and exhibited.
- Artefacts: an object made by a human being, typically one of cultural or historical interest.
- Tourists: a person who is travelling or visiting a place for pleasure.
- Skyscrapers: a very tall building of many storeys.

Science

The children will look at different objects and learn which material it is made of. In particular, we will explore the material, metal. As part of our learning we will be carrying out simple investigations to discover which material makes the best cutlery.

Geography

The children will learn of the differences between a town and the countryside. They will identify human and physical features in Stocksbridge and Sheffield, drawing maps to show these.

DT

The children will explore and evaluate a range of pictures, pop up books and moving pictures. They will use a range of tools and equipment to create their own moving picture with a city theme.





Writing

This half term we will be working on simple narrative (story writing). This will include the children writing simple sentences to retell a familiar story.

Grammar

We will be writing sentences using capital letters, full stops and finger spaces accurately.

We will be using nouns (naming words) and verbs (action words) to extend our sentences.

Handwriting

We will be checking the formation of all the letter shapes and their placement on our handwriting lines. It is important that all letters are formed correctly.

Spellings

The children will take part in weekly spelling checks. Please look out for spellings coming home and practise with your child. The words that the children will spell are linked to the high frequency words. It is important your child can read these words as well as spell them.

AT HOME: Please read your school reading books and practise reading your tricky words regularly. Please log reading on in your child's reading diary.

Phonics and Reading

We continue to use the Monster Phonics scheme of work in school to teach phonics.

Year 1 is an important year for Phonics. In June the children will take part in a government assessment known as a 'Phonics Screening check' which checks how well children know and use their phonics skills to read.

We encourage regular practise and engagement in reading through blending and practising new sounds using the resources that will be sent home. Regular reading practise using the books provided by school will also impact the progress your child makes.

Place Value - In our learning this half term we will be looking at counting and sorting objects; counting objects from a larger group; representing objects in different ways and will be learning more about '1 more and 1 less' whilst practise counting back with numbers within 10.

Jigsaw – Being Me in My World

In this topic, the children are learning to understand what is fair and unfair, kind and unkind, right and wrong. Children will learn to feel happy and secure in their new class whilst celebrating the achievements of others

Exploring pulse through songs and movement Controlling pulse using voices and instruments Exploring the difference between pulse and rhythm Copying and creating rhythmic patterns.





Children will build upon their previous knowledge and learn new information about the steel industry. They will learn why steel is an important part of Sheffield's history. The children will learn about Harry Brearley and his significance to the steel industry.



Children will learn how to use line and tone in drawings. They will work from observation and imagination to produce a detailed drawing of a building in Sheffield.



The children will express creatively their own ideas about the questions: Who am I? Where do I belong? How we all are connected? Talk about the fact that people come from different religions. How can we tell? How can we live together when we are all so different? Find out what different religions do to celebrate the fruitfulness of the earth – focus on Christian Harvest Festival and Muslim Zakat (charitable giving).

Music

This term we will be:

ICT Children will develop their understanding of technology and how it can help them in their everyday lives. They will start to become familiar with the different components of a computer by developing their keyboard and mouse skills. Childreb will also consider how to use technology responsibly.

PE

Indoor (Dance) – The children will explore travelling actions, movement skills and balancing. They will understand why it is important to count to music and use this in their dances.

Outdoor (Striking and Fielding) - the children will develop their understanding of the principles of defending (fielding) and attacking (batting) for striking and fielding games. They will use and develop skills such as throwing and catching, tracking a ball and striking a ball.
