

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

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Roblex is one of the most popular video games among children. In 2020, the game's developers claimed that more than half of the USA's children had played it. As a 'sandbox' title, the game lets players create their own gaming experiences with Roblex Studio to build custom levels, which can then be shared online.

ONLINE PLAY RISKS

Because Roblex connects random players across the world, it can put younger players into an environment with anonymous users who could use the platform for reflatious reasons. To example, some role-play games are used for anline dates and mature role play, which could expose youngsters to inappropriate messages in the public chat loss.

MATURE CONTENT

Content is difficult to moderate throughout Robler, due to the number of games available. This is particularly notable on smaller games and experiences, but in summary, some of the games and experiences offered on the platform contain age—inappropriate content that could easily be seen by young players.

IN-GAME SPENDING

The majority of games within Roblex have extensive monetisation aptions, usually through season passes or miscrotransocialous. Furchoses can range in value from a few pennies up to much larger sums of money, White same games ofter a lot of contant to purchases, others can ofter very title for real world money, causing

ANONYMOUS PLAYERS

The abonymity of users can leave players vulnerable to bullying. horsewhert, and predatory behaviour. Without the right parental controls or mentioring, users can connect with each other via personal messages or friend requests, and it is very difficult to know who's behind a username in this vast anxies.

RISK OF ADDICTION

Robins games can feature reverting or satisfying mechanics that keep players coming back - or persuade them to stay logged-in for much longer. Like most games, they sours on interactivity, with constant rewords via in-game unlocks and currencies, which can sometimes lead to an addictive need to remain entire for long periods of time.

Advice for Parents & Educators

MONITOR THE CONTENT
